ODDS AND ENDS

For an update HB261 has not change, not scheduled for a hearing, nor on the House calendar, hopefully it will stay that way. Just a reminder this bill was submitted by Representative LaKeySha Bosley out of District 079 of St Louis back in Dec of 2024 where after December 31, 2025, no person or entity shall sell any firearm ammunition unless the person or entity is designated by the secretary of state as a licensed ammunition seller.

If you look back at your March newsletter I wrote a short story about the Great Rivers Habitat Alliance (GRHA) and the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), a short excerpt from that article to refresh your mind:

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) and the Great Rivers Habitat Alliance (GRHA) recently entered into a cooperative agreement to protect habitat and add public and educational opportunities on nearly 785 privately-owned acres of prime wetland habitat in St. Charles County previously known as the Whistling Wings Duck Club. The Missouri Conservation Commission formally recognized the new partnership at its Feb. 7 open meeting in Jefferson City. Now, this cooperative agreement includes \$2 million in financial support from MDC to GRHA of YOUR tax dollars.

Recently I was forwarded an article that came from the GRHA website, www.grha.org, that they are holding a workshop called the 2025 GRHA Wetland And Habitat Management Workshop. From my reading, it is mainly for those managers of Privately Owned Duck Clubs, the cost is \$1,000 to attend and it is a three day event being held July 28 - 30 2025. Looking at the agenda, it does look very promising and the \$1,000 would cover the costs of everything they have going here. It almost looks like a conference, with dinners, social hours, networking etc. The sessions they are having, to me, looking at the presenters credentials, look very impressive. So I have mix feelings about this. All in all, it looks like a great thing that GRHA is doing, but I cannot get past that MDC gave GRHA \$2 Million of our tax payer dollars for this when it appears all of the members (at least the Board) are very well off individuals. How is the individual duck hunter who depends on the MDC management areas going to benefit from this which is being supported by your tax dollars? Yes, I currently hunt at a club, but I was for over forty years hunting only public land, and I still do. I just don't know how this will benefit the public hunting waterfowler and would like your feedback. let me know!

LIFETIME PERMITS

Art Meister brought to my attention last month when I posted about getting your fishing permits is that did you know that if you are between the ages of 60 and 64 that the life time fishing permit costs \$38 and that it includes the trout permit which costs \$12 annually? The lifetime hunting permit also cost \$38 which also includes the Conservation Order permit which costs \$5.50?

The life time fishing permit alone will pay for itself in about three years if you are over 64.

MDC SETS SEASONS

MDC sets upcoming migratory game bird and waterfowl seasons

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. – The Missouri Conservation Commission approved recommendations from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) at its April 4 meeting for upcoming 2025 migratory-game-bird-hunting seasons and 2025-2026 waterfowl-hunting seasons.

2025 MIGRATORY GAME BIRD HUNTING

Mourning Doves, Eurasian Collared Doves, and White-Winged Doves

Season: Sept. 1 through Nov. 29

Limits: 15 daily and 45 in possession combined total for all three species

Hours: One-half hour before

sunrise to sunset

Sora and Virginia Rails

Season: Sept. 1 through Nov. 9

Limits: 25 daily and 75 in possession combined for both species

Hours: One-half hour before

sunrise to sunset

Wilson's (Common) Snipe

Season: Sept. 1 through Dec. 16

Limits: 8 daily and 24 in posses-

sion

Hours: One-half hour before

sunrise to sunset

American Woodcock

Season: Oct. 18 through Dec. 1

Limits: 3 daily and 9 in possession

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset

Coots

Season: Same as duck season dates in the respective zones (See dates under Waterfowl Hunting for Ducks)

Limits: 15 daily and 45 in possession

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset

2025-2026 WATERFOWL HUNTING

Teal

Season: **Sept. 13 - 21**

Limits: 6 daily and 18 in posses-

sion

Hours: Sunrise to sunset

Ducks

Season:

North Zone: Nov. 1 through

Dec. 30

Middle Zone: Nov. 1 - 9 and Nov. 15 through Jan. 4, 2026

South Zone: Nov. 27 – 30 and Dec. 7 through Jan. 31, 2026

Bag Limit: 6 ducks daily with species restrictions of:

4 mallards (no more than 2 females)

3 wood ducks

2 redheads

2 hooded mergansers

2 canvasbacks

2 black ducks

3 pintail

2 scaup for first 45 days and 1 scaup for last 15 days

1 mottled duck

Possession Limit: Three times the daily bag or 18 total, varies by species

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset

Snow Geese (White and Blue Phases) and Ross's Geese

Season: Nov. 11 through Feb. 6, 2026

Limits: 20 blue, snow, or Ross's geese daily with no possession limit

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset

White-Fronted Geese

Season: Nov. 11 through Feb. 6, 2026

Limits: 2 daily and 6 in possession

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset

Canada Geese and Brant

Season: Oct. 4 - 12 and Nov. 11 - Feb. 6, 2026

Limits: 3 Canada geese and Brant in aggregate daily, 9 in possession

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset

Light Goose Conservation Order

Season: Feb. 7 through April 30, 2026

Limits: No daily or possession limits

Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset

Methods: For the taking of blue, snow and Ross's geese, hunters may use shotguns capable of holding more than three shells and recorded or electronically amplified bird calls or sounds or imitations of bird calls or sounds.

YOUTH HUNTING DAYS

North Zone: Oct. 25 and 26 Middle Zone: Oct. 25 and 26 South Zone: Nov. 22 and 23

Limits: Same as during regular

waterfowl season

Hours: Same as during regular

waterfowl season

Requirements: Any person 15 years of age or younger may participate in youth waterfowl hunting days without permit provided they are in the immediate presence of an adult 18 years of age or older. If the youth hunter is not certified in hunter education, the adult must have the required permits and have in his or her possession proof of hunter education unless exempt. The adult may not hunt ducks but may participate in other seasons that are open on youth hunting days.

MFOR

What is IFOR?

IFOR is a unique coalition of individuals and organizations. We are one of the most unusual sportsmen's groups anywhere because we don't blow the horn or promote the cause of any single special interest group. IFOR represents all outdoorsmen, all sportsmen, and all recreational users. We believe it is critical that we all band together under one large umbrella organization

to form a united front against those who would take from us what is rightfully ours.

MISSION STATEMENT

To unite all outdoor resource user groups and conservationists (ex. hunters, fishermen, trappers, trail riders, etc.), dedicated to preserving, restoring and developing the State's natural resources, and to provide a professional liaison to the Illinois Legislature and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), to protect sportsmen's rights and recreational opportunities; and to work together to ensure long-term, adequate dedicated funding for, and professional management of the IDNR.

IFOR is a not-for-profit 501 C (4) Conservation Organization whose main purpose is to unite Illinois Outdoorsmen under one statewide umbrella and protect and defend the recreational rights of natural resource users in the state of Illinois. Currently we have united over 100 conservation groups and in excess of 76,000 outdoorsmen as members of IFOR.

This is exactly what we need here in Missouri. Granted, after chatting a bit with Tony, CFM does this similarly, however, if we have another avenue to voice our opinions would be a great thing. More organizations and individuals under one voice to ensure our outdoor activities, be it hunting, fishing or any outdoor activity is to remain here currently and for the next generation. With the current polocies that MDC is doing now, it is more than important to get organized, in which case we might be too late, for example: River blinds taken away, even when it was totally against by hunters, MDC turned a blind ear. Columbia Bottoms, the once jewel of MDC looks like a slum and now this cooperative agreement with the Great Rivers Habitat Alliance.

We need a larger voice to be heard. Not just single individuals or group voicing concerns to MDC and Jefferson City and this could be the answer.
